Playground Safety

La Perle Playground is back open as of May 22!

Playgrounds, skateparks, tennis, pickleball, volleyball and basketball courts, disc golf, outdoor fitness parks and athletic tracks have reopened for safe use.

Please follow safe use guidelines as per the City of Edmonton's website.

- Gather in a group less than 50 people
- Maintain 2 meters from others not in my household or cohort household
- Only share common equipment with my household or cohort
- Stay home if I am experiencing symptoms (go home if I develop symptoms)
- Wash or sanitize my hands and cough/sneeze into my elbow or a tissue
- Disinfect equipment before and after use.

Sports Fields and Athletic Tracks

What Can I Do? Sports training, dryland training, skills practice. With my household or cohort: Baseball, and other diamond sports. Football, Cricket, Lacrosse, Soccer, Rugby, Field Hockey, Ball Hockey.

What Can't I Do? No league play. No scrimmages or pick up games with people outside your family or cohort.

Parks & Open Spaces

What can I do? Picnics / barbecues, Use the trails, Paddling, singles Kicking a ball, Informal stick sports (e.g shooting, passing), With my household or cohort: Frisbee, Lawn Bowling, Horseshoes, Bocce ball, Paddling.

Consider wearing a mask to limit the risk of spread to others. Bring my own food, drinks, utensils, & hand sanitizer. Take measures to ensure no accidental contact between participants. Make sure participants do not touch the same ball or equipment. Follow all other public health guidelines.

EFCL Park Play Program

In the absence of the Green Shack Program this summer, the EFCL will be providing park play programs at select parks in Edmonton. Leaders will be situated in parks to provide drop-in play opportunities for children 8-12 years old, four days a week, from July 13- August 27th. All activities (sports, games & crafts) will be planned and delivered with the safety and health of participants kept top of mind.

The program runs twice a day from Monday to Thursday. 9:30am-11:30am: Lewis Estates, Westmount, Strathcona, Kenilworth, and Griesbach 1:30pm-3:30pm: Summerlea, Canora, Millhurst, Capilano, Fraser, and Brookview

They Poop, You Scoop

It's the right thing to do.

We all know we should pick up our dog's poop, but it's very easy to forget a bag or look the other way especially when no one else is around. Don't be that kind of dog owner. Make a point of scooping your dog's poop every single time they go on public property. Carry a few bags with you so you're always prepared to pick up after your dog.

Neglecting to pick up after your dog could mean that someone else picks it up ... on their shoes.

Far more seriously, it could expose people and other pets to bacteria, viruses and parasites in your pet's waste.

You could also end up with a \$100 fine.

There's no denying that scooping up poop is an unpleasant job, but it's a responsibility that comes with owning your dog and a small price to pay for the joys of owning a furry friend.



Help keep the pathways around the park poop free, and please remember that all dogs on parkland must be on a leash.

Reminder: La Perle rinks are not considered an offleash park; please refrain from using them for your dogs. The nearest off-leash area is Callingwood or Patricia Ravine, visit the City of Edmonton's website for locations and details of all dog parks in our city.

The Benefits of Neighboring

Increased Care of Neighbors

- Awareness and activation of the diverse needs, skills, and experiences of residents.
- Neighbors helping neighbors; everyone contributing to neighborhood life according to their interests and abilities.
- Watching out for each other. Creating a village for children to grow and play; looking in on seniors and others who can use additional care.
- Better overall mental and physical health through new opportunities for relationships and recreation.

Increased Care of Shared Spaces — The Environments We Call Home

- Increased block identity and pride.
- Sense of shared ownership and responsibility for local infrastructure like open parkland, playgrounds, community gardens and public buildings.
- Alignment with movement to 'Think Global
- Act Local'; promoting local food, water and energy security reducing environmental footprint.

Increased Civic Engagement and Economic Opportunity

- Connected citizens are more likely to engage with and influence community and its institutions. Opportunity to have a more engaged and representative voice in government affairs.
- Enhanced opportunities for employment through relationships and connections in the neighborhood.
- Shared neighborhood vision to build a strong local economy.

Increased Social and Cultural Awareness

- Increased sense of belonging to the block and neighborhood.
- Local and accessible companionship and friendship.
- More groups to join for recreation, fun, education and social time within the neighborhood.
- Opportunity to know people from a wide variety of cultures, backgrounds, experiences and ages.
- Opportunity for intergenerational relationships.

Increased Safety

- Increased safety on the block and in the neighborhood quick help nearby when you really need it.
- "Stranger Danger" decreases as children learn the names of neighbors and residents get to know more about each other.
- Residents are able to watch out for each other with insights about each other's needs and schedules.

Shared Knowledge, Creativity, & Innovation

- Collective wisdom, guidance, ideas and innovation from broad perspectives shared among neighbors.
- Emergence of creative solutions to common problems by using the unique assets, perspectives and abilities of the neighbourhood.

Neighborhood Empowerment Team

We all deserve to live in a safe community and city, but there can be many things that impact our perceptions of safety. One of the challenges is that the things that can make us feel unsafe, are the ones that often go unreported. These can include things like a vehicle that appears to be abandoned, graffiti or an unkept property. It can also be suspicious activity such as someone approaching vehicles and trying door handles or peering in house or garage windows. It could be a vehicle driving through the area over and over at odd hours or a broken window. It can be easier for you to recognize when something seems out of the ordinary because you are most familiar with your community. These types of occurrences can be unnerving and when they go unreported we put the police at a disadvantage because they rely on us to tell them what seems out of the ordinary. Your report is a valuable piece of information, and each time you report, the chances of preventing or solving a crime improves.

Here is how you can help:

- Get to know your neighbours and the vehicles that belong in your neighbourhood. When you know the people who are from your area you are better able to know when a car or person appears to be out of the ordinary.
- Pay attention to your surroundings as you move through the neighbourhood; note the little details like an open garage door or back gate. Be aware of potential hiding spots, recent vandalism, burned out street lights or unsightly garbage.
- Stay up to date on reported crimes in your area by accessing the Edmonton Police Service's Neighbourhood Crime Mapping too

- Get to know your neighbours and the Take action, if you see something unusual;
 - Call 9-1-1 if it is an emergency where life, safety or property is in immediate danger or there is a crime in progress.
 - Call the non-emergency line with concerns or information on a previous crime 780-423-4567 or #377 (on mobile devices).
 - Remember that certain crimes, like theft from a vehicle or damage to property, can be reported online at edmontonpolice.ca or by using the EPS Mobile App.
 - Graffiti, burned out street lights, unsightly or unkempt properties can be reported to the City of Edmonton by calling 3-1-1 or the Edmonton 311 App.
 - Share the information you have on crime prevention strategies, such as in the Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) Guide, contact net@edmonton.ca for a copy.
 - Let your neighbors know when their gate or garage door is open or if there is something that makes their property vulnerable.

We all want our communities to be as safe as possible. Even the smallest piece of information can help reduce crime and disorder.
